### **Reflections on the 2014 Conference**

III. James D. Cole, 33° Lt. Grand Commander and S.G.I.G. in Virginia

Laughter, good food and fine fellowship; inspiration from Old Dominion University's RiteCare leader and the bright students supported by Scottish Rite; education and enlightenment from our Friday presenters; motivation from the exciting new Valley Membership Achievement Project (VMAP.

We took these thoughts, feelings, ideas and reflections with us, like precious little gifts, as we journeyed home from the 2014 Orient of Virginia Conference, hosted by the Valley of Norfolk. The two hundred or so of us who enjoyed the hospitality of the Virginia Beach setting may not have realized that the planning efforts began at least a couple of years before we arrived. Perhaps we thanked our hosts from Norfolk enough for all the hours of preparation and service that they provided, but if not, we can still thank them personally.

I have had the pleasure of hosting a fellow SGIG at each of the last two conferences. In 2013, III. Jack Yost, 33° and his wife Chris joined us from West Virginia. They left full of amazement and this spring; West Virginia held its first Orient Conference, inspired by Virginia. This year, III. Marlin Mills, 33° and his wife Brenda joined us from Maryland. They left excited and wondering if Maryland could also pull off a similar conference.

They say, "imitation is the most sincere form of flattery."

My hope is that a conference that can motivate non-Virginians to imitate our example can also motivate our own Brethren in Virginia to be excited about our Rite. The Valley Membership Achievement Project (VMAP) was introduced at the conference and is, in my opinion, one of the most exciting efforts ever undertaken in the world of Freemasonry.

VMAP began with the goal of engaging our members; engaging new members in a way that made for strong and lasting bonds, and engaging our existing members to ensure a continued and strengthened relationship with them. VMAP was developed from the simple theory that our own members probably best understand what can work for them. In order to enhance membership engagement, workshops were designed to ask the members themselves how we should proceed. In three workshops around the country, I had the privilege of moderating the meetings. We asked our Brethren for ideas, either new or proven, as possible tools to use in membership engagement. We received 400 ideas. Some of them were duplicated among the three workshops, meaning that the ideas were suggested in three different areas of our country. The 400 ideas were reviewed, summarized and outlined in the VMAP Workbook, which can be found at <a href="http://scottishrite.org/about/media-publications/manual-brochure/vmap-workbook/">http://scottishrite.org/about/media-publications/manual-brochure/vmap-workbook/</a>.

So what is VMAP? In my opinion, it is a cookbook of membership recipes. Broken down into ten categories, it provides great ideas to improve our membership efforts. Some of these suggestions have long been performed in Virginia Valleys; some are new and interesting ideas. The VMAP effort asks first that each Valley sign up to simply try. I cannot imagine why any Valley would not even "try." If a Valley signs up to try, they will be presented with a certificate by the Supreme

The intent of VMAP is to help each Valley carry out its service to the Scottish Rite by providing the very best experience for its members. VMAP requirements are broken into the following 10 specific subject Areas which cover the full scope of the Scottish Rite experience:

- Membership Recruitment
- New Member Engagement
- Degree Conferral Proficiency
- Reunion Experience
- Scottish Rite Education for Candidates
- Scottish Rite Education for Members
- Officer Responsibilities & Engagement
- Philanthropy & Public Image
- Membership Retention Valley Organizations

Valleys that choose to participate in VMAP will receive a Certificate of Participation. Participating Valleys that reach specific thresholds in each of the above areas will receive a VMAP Achievement Award plaque along with VMAP Achievement lapel pins for their members. It is important to note that VMAP is not a competition between Valleys and it runs for 12 months at a time, aligned with the calendar year. Why the recognition? Certificates, plaques, lapel pins? The recognition simply says to the Masonic world "our Rite is important enough for us to try some new ideas."

I am very proud that Virginia already has five of our eight Valleys formally enrolled; two more have the paperwork completed, and our final one is preparing its paperwork. We may be the first multi-Valley Orient with all Valleys enrolled!

Viewing VMAP in the reflection of the warm memories of our Conference, I see VMAP as an attempt to ensure that more of our members can join together over the next ninety years enjoying more great weekends, like we have experienced in Virginia at the Orient Conference since 1924. The heritage that we have established with our Conference is something we want more people to enjoy.

We should each promise to do our best before next year's Conference to bring in one new member to Scottish Rite, encourage one member to stay in Scottish Rite and bring one new attendee to our Conference next year in Alexandria.

If it is of value, let's share it.

### **ADM Bill Sizemore Joins The Supreme Council Staff**

The Supreme Council executive staff now has a Director of Operations, RADM William G. "Bill" Sizemore II, 33°, USN, Retired, son of the Grand Executive Director, RADM William G. "Gene" Sizemore, 33°, GC, USN, Retired. "Admiral Bill" reported for duty in December, with a calm, unassuming presence that belied the depth of his abilities. He brings with him years of practical leadership in the US Navy plus an MBA from the College of William and Mary-a combination of hands-on experience and business skills that will serve the Supreme Council well.

III. Sizemore was born in 1957 in Carmel, California, while his father was stationed at the Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, California. He and his wife Diane have three children: Elizabeth who works in Washington, Becka who is a student at California Polytechnic State University, and William III who is in elementary school. He entered the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland, in 1976, graduated in 1980, and followed in his father's steps when he became a Naval Aviator in 1982. He progressed through the naval service, earned a master's degree in Business Administration from the College of William and Mary, graduated from the National War College with a master's degree in National Security Studies, and was promoted to the rank of Rear Admiral USN in September 2009.

He participated as a carrier pilot in Operations Desert Storm and Iraqi Freedom. He is among the few to have achieved his 1,000th carrier-arrested landing. He served at the Naval Strike and Air Warfare Center in Fallon, Nevada, as the training officer and director of the Navy Fighter School.

### Naval Biography

Sizemore has a master's degree in Business Administration from the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Va., and a master's degree in National Security Studies from National Defense University in Washington, D.C. He has accumulated over 6,000 flight hours in fighter and strike fighter aircraft and over 1,000 carrierarrested landings. His individual military decorations include the Defense Superior Service Medal. Legion of Merit (two awards), Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (four awards), Individual Air Medal with Combat V, Strike Flight Air Medal (six awards), Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (three awards) and Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal.







## Overall opinion of the State of the Valley of Richmond:



### SR Chirp



SR Chirp is a Smartphone app that enables Scottish Rite Masons to communicate quickly & conveniently

**SR Chirp video** 

The Scottish Rite of Freemasonry—Southern Jurisdiction is making a new tool available exclusively to Scottish Rite Masons, known as SR Chirp. This is a personal communication and messaging utility which operates as a mobile phone application and is unique to the Scottish Rite.

Maintaining meaningful personal communications in today's fast-paced and technology intense day can be challenging. Smartphones are everywhere, and a variety or services including Facebook, Twitter, and text messaging make keeping in touch possible using many different methods.

Each popular technology provides benefits as well as challenges. With so much information available to us, it's often hard to keep track of some of the messages that are most important.

The name "Chirp" was selected by the application's developer, which has other business-to-consumer projects apart from the Scottish Rite. SR Chirp messages are known as "Chirps."

Using the application, Scottish Rite members may to "Chirp" to each other

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and share their experiences, day-to-day interactions and thoughts, updates from their local Valleys and Orients, or simply stay connected throughout the jurisdiction.

The application enables Scottish Rite Masons to quickly and conveniently communicate and interact. Although SR Chirp is similar to text messaging in some ways, because SR Chirp is usable only by Scottish Rite members, it becomes simple to separate communications with brothers from the sometimes overwhelming number of messaging that are part of our personal and business lives.

SR Chirp users also customize the messages that they desire to see. A user might elect to view only messages from his own Valley, or might decide to reach out to another Valley where he is traveling. Because the application is location-aware, users can elect to see messages and interact with other users easily and conveniently wherever they are—and not see messages from locations or Valleys that are not of immediate interest.

SR Chirp is available as a free download on Android mobile platforms and coming soon for Apple devices.

Installation is simple and registration requires only that you confirm your membership and create a user ID through the <u>my.scottishrite.org</u> portal if you have not already done so. Activation instructions are included with the application installation.

Continuing with our support of education we received the Rite Care scholarship recipients from Radford University at our Stated dinner in September 2013. They each gave a synopsis of their graduate thesis and their future goals.

November 2013 Wor. Bro. John Hartsock 32° KCCH, led a program on the JROTC/ROTC program the Scottish Rite supports. We had the recipients from 4 local High Schools and VA Tech, who spoke about their program and how it works. In total we give out 8 JROTC medals and ribbons and 1 ROTC.

## Thirteenth Degree

### Royal Arch Of Solomon Summary

Men must find the truth within the caverns of their own conscience. There is one great arch, or bridge which makes the passage achievable, and allows us to master our own vices and passions. That bridge is the will of God. By seeking knowledge and moral character and being guided by faith and reason, the Mason will know how to combine science and religion, philosophy and theology; and recognize that these notions do not contradict each other, but form a harmonious whole.

### **DUTIES:**

Seek knowledge.
Be motivated by duty and honor.

### FOR REFLECTION:

Are idle hours and idle words subject to the great law of retribution?

### **IMPORTANT SYMBOLS:**

Enoch, Adoniram, Yehu-Aber, Satolkin, the descent into the vault, the arch, cube of agate, triangle of gold, name of Deity.



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### Thirteenth Degree

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The jewel is a circular medal of gold, around which, on one side are the following letters, words and number: R, S, R, S, T, P, S, R, I, A, J, et S, ANNO ENOCHI 2995. On the same side is an engraving of the ground with a rectangular hole in it into which two men are lowering a third with a rope. On the reverse side is a triangle emitting rays and in the middle of it the same letter as is on the apron. This medal is to be worn upon the chest, suspended by a narrow, white watered ribbon. The letters stand for: *Regnante Solomone, Rege Sapientissimo, Thesaurum Pretiosissimum Sub Ruinis Invenerunt Adonirum, Joabert, et Satolkin ... Anno Enochi 2995;* or 'In the reign of Solomon, wisest of kings, Adonirum, Joabert and Satolkin found under the ruins the most precious treasure'. Let the emblem on the reverse side of the jewel always remind us that the good Mason reveres and adores the Grand Architect of the Universe, and endeavors, by pursuing the path of honor and duty, to perform the part assigned him in the world well and faithfully.

The cordon is a broad, watered purple ribbon worn from the right shoulder to the left hip from which is suspended a triangle of gold bars.

The apron is of crimson velvet. Upon it is embroidered a triangle emitting rays, and in the middle a letter, an archaic form of the Semitic *Yod*. The color denotes the zeal and devotedness of a Royal Arch Mason. The triangle is the emblem of Deity, or Infinite Wisdom, Infinite Power and Infinite Harmony; the letter represents the Tetragammaton, the Name of God made known to Moses.

"Like other degrees it is known by other names: The Royal Arch of Enoch, the Royal Arch and the Royal Arch Ecossais (Scottish Royal Arch). It must be remembered that Albert Pike wrote the degrees of the Scottish Rite in the 19th century and in doing so, he selected, combined, deleted and elaborated material from the numerous and varied degrees existing at the time. The other names associated with this degree attest to both its heritage and its importance in Freemasonry.

*Ecossais* is a French word, usually translated 'Scottish'; according to Mackey, it may also be translated as 'Scottish Master.' Under whatever name this particular degree may be found, it is essentially a legend accounting for the recovery of that which was lost. The older versions recount that the True Word was engraved on a triangular plate of gold that was cast into a dry well; but the new versions relate that the True Word, also engraved on a golden plate, was deposited in a purposely prepared place to be found centuries later by three masters.

Enoch, also in a name of the degree, is an important Masonic character. He was an ancient Hebrew patriarch and predecessor of Solomon. From Genesis (5:24) we learn that his life was one of exceptional virtue; he is described "as walking with God." He is said to have lived 365 years, his earthly life ending not by death but by being bodily transported to Heaven (Genesis 5:23). We are told he received the gift of wisdom and knowledge from God and was learned in astronomy and astrology. Tradition tells us that God, seeing in Enoch a man of perfect virtue, elected to reveal to him His true name. After receiving it in a dream, Enoch's vision continued and he was conveyed vertically through nine arches into a subterranean vault which contained a triangular plate of gold upon which was written the name of God. Enoch took the dream as a sign from God and after a long journey through Canaan, or the Holy Land, he excavated nine apartments vertically into the earth each covered with an arch, the lowest hewn out of solid rock. In this apartment he placed an alabaster pedestal and mounted upon it a cube of agate into one side of which he had sunk a triangular plate of gold inscribed with the name of Deity - thus fulfilling the purpose of his vision.

Above the apartments he built a modest temple of unhewn stones with a secret passage into the apartments under a stone with a ring through it.

The Bible provides us with the reason for unhewn stones, for God decreed His altars to be such:

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### Thirteenth Degree

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And if thou wilt make me an altar of stone, thou shalt not build it of hewn stone, for if thou lift up thy upon it, thou hast polluted it (Exodus 20:25).


This passage also explains the prohibition against "the sound of axe, hammer, or any tool of iron" during the construction of King Solomon's Temple as related in Masonic tradition, which itself has a specific Biblical source (1 Kings 6:7).

The legend provided in the *Liturgy* explains that during the construction of King Solomon's Temple an administration center was needed. The site chosen for this center was unknowingly that of Enoch's original temple. It was believed that the ruins were of an ancient pagan temple. During the removal of the ruins, the secret passage was discovered. Adoniram and two of his assistants (Yehu-Aber and Satolkin) successively lowered each other into the dark vertical passage, each reaching farther than the one before him. Finally, Adoniram himself reached the ninth apartment where he discovered the treasure left there by Enoch.

The next day the three Master Architects returned and removed the cube of agate which they conveyed to King Solomon who immediately recognized the word engraved upon the golden plate in its side as the Ineffable Name of Deity. According to tradition, Solomon knew the word because he had received it from his father, David, who had received it from the prophet Samuel. Solomon created this degree, it is said, to reward the zeal and dedication of the discoverers of this great treasure.

In Hebrew, the name Enoch is *Henoch* and means: initiate, instruct, teach and dedicate. In the Koran of the Moslems, Enoch is called 'Edris,' derived from a word which means to read or to study with attention. In Freemasonry Enoch, therefore, has become a symbol of initiation and the acquisition of knowledge." (pp. 88-90)

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
