The Key By Bro. Gerald L. Frey, 32°, KCCH (Presented at our September meeting)

This evening it was suggested that the topic should be education, more pointedly, Scottish Rite education. Within Scottish Rite Masonry, we are by far and away the best served of any of the other bodies with education, resources, and Mentors. They start from the top and if we work with them, they, work for us.

There is no other organization that makes available such a breadth of material than the Scottish Rite. This is likely due to their professional staff and dedication to scholarship. This scholarship is not inclusive alone, any type of Masonic occurrence or development is studied in several different manners. We also receive the benefit of updates and revisions, while other bodies are regrettably slow to accomplish the same.

Here is the sticking point. Every Masonic survey tells us there are two things Masons want: number one is fellowship and close behind is number two which is education. Some say feed them and they will come. Perhaps we might add, if you educate them, they will stay. It may seem obvious that we will make better, more long-lasting decisions if we have the facts. Again, the feeding has to be appetizing. Just as our stomachs have a capacity for hunger, being full, and being too full, so do some of the other parts of the body, when it comes to learning. Sitting too long and not having ideas of relevance can keep the mind from comprehending the message.

Having an opportunity to reference the "old" and to some, the outmoded books of our past Scottish Rite leaders, they all say the same; WITHOUT EDUCATION THERE CAN BE NO DEDICATION. Inevitably, it follows that THERE IS NOTHING MORE EXPENSIVE THAN IGNORANCE. The author of these simple phrases makes this prediction, "Unless there is a drastic change within the Craft there will be no recognizable Freemasonry," so says Allen Roberts. Others have echoed these sentiments for generations.

It is not for lack of Masonic material, more specifically Scottish Rite material that members drift off, however, it is often the lack of information about our Rite that makes them wonder what is the use and purpose. Some indicate it is obvious by all of the good and great things we do for our communities and charities. Here the point is missed. For many of the years, I have been a Mason I could not explain how to get into the Masonic Home. Obvious? Hardly, this last blast of correspondence and their required reading in each Lodge proves the point from a Past Grand Master to the Lodge to individual Masons. It was not clear. Right Worshipful John Malliarakis has given the finest explanation I have ever heard in a compelling and thoughtful way. If our Crown Jewel cannot be understood, care should be taken to make it clear. If our ritual is, to some, a word salad, care should be taken to make it clear. And if Scottish Rite membership is unclear about what and who we are, special care should be taken to make it clear.

Who is to blame? Everyone and no one. Truth be told, education, learning, and teaching require effort, and yes, commitment. Our efforts are to take the remarkable resources available to Scottish Rite Masons and maximize them whenever possible. Sometimes during our meetings, a short reading or program would fill the "dead time." Then there are those periods between degrees that we have time to do more than just stretch our legs for brief talks and discussions on our Rite.

With Masonic education the Craft often seems to be spinning one of the great game show roulette wheels, trying the latest in a long line of methodologies, each new, improved, modern, and of the age. When it comes to Scottish Rite masonry it is easy to overlook that this is adult education. Sound too academic? Adults learn differently than children for a variety of reasons: experiences, occupations, changing careers, relationships, etc. And straight lesson plans require more or perhaps less depending upon your point of view when it comes to adult

The word "team" might not have an "I" in it but almost everything in education does (history, science, mathematics, English, philosophy, and, yes, ritual, etc.). For all of us, education is a personal expansion, or should be distinct and a conscience decision to learn about the Fraternity. However, that is only the first step in Masonic education. Next is selecting from an array of materials, some being formal (correspondence courses) and others self-directed. Why wide array? For those that undertake the self-directed way, and at some point, you will if you choose to advance in the knowledge of yourself and Masonry's many facets.

Let us begin with the formal pathway, which courses do you choose from? Scottish Rite Master Builder program comes to mind, which is new and improved. Before these courses were developed there was and is the Scottish Rite Research Society with both the *Plumbline*, *Heredom*, and the *Scottish Rite Journal* (book reviews), and several other publications either directly or indirectly managed by the Supreme Council. Not a dud in the bunch.

What then is the solution? Could it be as simple as feeding them and they will come, education and they will stay? I firmly believe this to be true. To add to this belief, it is how we make good men better. If the Masonry needs a key to move forward successfully rather than simply survive, our Scottish Rite has that key.

The Scottish Rite Double Headed Eagle



The symbol most widely recognized by Scottish Rite Masonry is the Double-Headed Eagle of Lagash. It is one of the oldest Royal Crests in existence. This symbol has been in use at least a thousand years before the Hebrew Exodus from Egypt and more than 2,000 years before the building of King Solomon's Temple

Records indicate that in the early days of modern Freemasonry, the Double-Headed Eagle was first used around 1758 by a Masonic body in Paris. That Masonic body was known as "The Emperors of the East and West" and controlled the advanced Degrees then in use. These degrees became a precursor of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite.

Our Double-Headed Eagle features the orange-ribboned motto, pendant from the hilt of the sword to the point, and displays the Latin "SPES MEA IN DEO EST", which translates "My Hope Is in God". As a Scottish Rite Mason, you will recognize this phrase from the lessons taught in the 31°.

Generally, the symbolic meaning of this symbol in the Scottish Rite is that of duality contained in or resolving itself, in unity. Among other things, it reminds us that as a man we are composed of both body and spirit, that he is both temporary and eternal; that both good and evil exist in the world, and we must perpetually espouse good while opposing evil. It also reminds us knowledge comes both from study and insight, and our obligations are both to ourselves and to others; that both faith and reason are necessary.

STATEMENT OF UNITY

SEPTEMBER 7, 2022

he Supreme Council Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction; United Supreme Council, 33°, of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, Prince Hall Affiliation, Southern Jurisdiction of the USA; the Supreme Council, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction; and the United Supreme Council, 33°, of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, Prince Hall Affiliation, Northern Jurisdiction of the USA, in unity and harmony, declare the following statement of principles.

The Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry began in 1801 in Charleston, South Carolina.

Our Councils recognize one another as the sole and legitimate conservators of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite within our recognized jurisdictions, which together compose the entirety of all lawful and recognized Scottish Rite activity within the United States of America and its territories.

We agree that the Supreme Councils of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry were founded as appendant bodies of symbolic Masonic Lodges. These Lodges are

chartered and governed by their applicable Grand Lodge. Each of our members are, and must remain, members in good standing in a Lodge existing within a recognized Grand Lodge. Our organizations believe that Masonic principles as identified through Grand Lodges are foundational, not merely optional, principles upon which we build to provide further light. We agree and affirm that the local rules governing visitation among our Bodies and all membership activity shall be in accordance with the rules established by the applicable,

cognized Grand Lodge within the state or territory.

We agree and affirm that no other Supreme Council may be recognized or legitimately exist within the United States of America without the proper recognition of one or more of our Supreme Councils, in accordance with our rules and procedures for fraternal recognition

We pledge ourselves to support one another in the cause of Scottish Rite Freemasonry, that our members may enjoy the benefits of our kind and gentle craft and the world at large may be convinced of its good effects.

In token thereof, we affix our signatures as the Sovereign Grand Commanders of our Supreme Councils.
